

The Supplement to the Workshop Meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold was held on Monday, June 27, 2011 at 7:00 PM in the Municipal Building.

In the absence of Mayor Wilson, Council President Schnurr stated that the notice of the time, date and location of the meeting had been provided pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 231 of the Laws of 1975 (Open Public Meetings Act).

Council President Schnurr opened the meeting with the Salute to the Flag, followed by a moment of silence.

Councilwoman Shutzer offered a motion to accept the minutes from the Workshop Meeting May 16, 2011 and Regular Meeting June 6, 2011, seconded by Councilman DiBenedetto.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; Councilman Sims abstained on the May 16, 2011 meeting and Councilman Kane and Councilman Newman abstained on the June 6, 2011 meeting; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 5 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold Honoring Emily O’Neill.”

Council President Schnurr read and presented the resolution.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated Emily O’Neill is his niece. He explained that Emily’s parents should also be congratulated for getting her to practice at 6:00 AM and then picking her up at 6:00 PM most nights. He is extremely proud of her for accomplishing her goals and becoming a champion. The most satisfying thing in sports, as an athlete, is to win again and keep her title.

Councilwoman Shutzer offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman DiBenedetto:

RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF FREEHOLD HONORING EMILY O’NEILL.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 6 on the Agenda as follows:

“Proclamation of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold Declaring June 19, 2011 as Juneteenth in the Borough of Freehold.”

Councilwoman Shutzer presented the proclamation on June 19, 2011 at a beautiful service at the Squirrel Town Cemetery.

County President Schnurr read Item No. 7 on the Agenda as follows:

“Second Reading and Public Hearing: Ordinance #2011/6 Adopting Official Map Establishing Designated Parking and Circulation Plan of the Market Yard Parking Lot.”

Council President Schnurr opened the meeting to the public.

Carl Steinberg, 2 Monmouth Avenue, presented photos to the governing body of the Market Yard parking lot changes. The first recommendation he made was that the traffic go "in" only. The traffic should go "in" one-way off of East Main Street. This would accommodate 4 cars angle parked for 20 minutes. Then when you come in you would make a right-hand turn, similar to Freehold Raceway and J.F.K. Airport and exit onto Mechanic Street or Center Street. The traffic light on Center Street would need to be increased because as it stands now the light only allows 6 cars out on Center Street and 4 cars out on Spring Street and with increased traffic it would get bottle-necked there.

Mr. Steinberg stated it is not fair that you get 5 twenty minute parking spaces along the Mellon Farms property, there should be 6 parking spots along Freehold Tire and the road is a two-way. When you drive in the Freehold Raceway Mall there are no left-hand turns throughout the entire shopping center. Behind the American Hotel there are only 3 handicap parking places there now, they are proposing 4. He recommended 1 handicap parking space be a loading and unloading zone. It gives a person a place to park for loading and unloading for all of the businesses. There is a spot there that has 18' of landscaping, he recommended taking 4 spaces out and putting in 4 parallel parking spaces.

Mr. Steinberg stated one of the proposed changes was the 2 hour parking should go to 3 hour parking. He explained that someone could come in at 8:00 AM and stay until 11:00AM, then get another three hours from 11:00 AM – 2:00 PM and then another three hours from 2:00 PM – 5:00 PM and if that car is not marked that person is parking the entire day for free. He recommends the Borough hire part-time officers who can mark all of the parking lots. He also recommended the Borough go to paid meter stations. The average cost to maintain a parking space throughout the year is \$350. The Borough charges \$24/year for a permit, which ends up being .09 cents a day. You cannot plow, light, paint, fix or patrol a parking lot for \$.09 a day. The commuter lot is \$.30 cents a day. Each study that has been done shows a different amount of parking spaces in the Market Yard Lot. The block and lot should be listed on the map instead of business names because the businesses keep changing. He stated he felt he did his homework and he did try to discuss this with the FCP. He feels the Borough should get a new map, repair all of the signs and increase the fares for parking permits.

Council President Schnurr asked if by Mellon Farms are those aisles one-way and should the rest be two-way.

Mr. Steinberg explained the only one lane that is two-way is the middle lane. There would be 3 lanes going one-way and the middle lane going two-way and then there would be 3 lanes going one-way the other direction.

Council President Schnurr asked if this was relayed to the FCP when they were developing this plan.

Mr. Steinberg explained he had a hard time getting the map. The first draft he received didn't include all the areas. But he feels the map he presented would be the "best bang for the buck". He gave a copy on Friday to the Borough Clerk for distribution.

Council President Schnurr stated the Planning Board is in the process of doing a Re-examination of the Master Plan and one of the things being addressed would be charging for parking waivers and reviewing what the Borough charges for parking permits. Council President Schnurr stated he is not a fan of parking meters.

Mr. Steinberg explained the meters he is referring to are not individual meters, they would be parking stations. They are the cheapest and most effective.

Councilman Sims stated this issue has been discussed for several months and Mr. Gatto stated the FCP met and the meeting was poorly attended but those that were there were in full agreement.

Mr. Steinberg explained the people surrounding the Market Yard were the only ones notified. This was not brought up to the general public. This is the first time he noticed this was being done at a public hearing.

Councilman Sims stated at the last league conference he attended a session on parking meters with Mr. Bellina.

Councilwoman Shutzer asked if this presentation was given to the FCP. We have been talking about this for several months now. She doesn't disagree with the information provided by

Mr. Steinberg and she respects the amount of work he has done on this, but she doesn't understand why it is being brought up now.

Mr. Steinberg responded he no longer attends the FCP meetings but when he did attend he asked if they asked their engineer if the parking lot could have a one-way. They responded the parking lot must be two-way.

Rich Gatto, Director of the FCP stated that 90% of what was suggested tonight was erroneous and could not be supported by facts. The plan you see before you is the result of an engineering study that was paid for and provided to the Borough. This plan was reviewed by the Borough engineer, as well as, the County engineer. When we originally started this there were five conceptual plans. We chose Plan 3 and made various changes to this plan and the final plan became Plan 3C.

He stated at the request of the Borough a public hearing was done, in the same manner as the Planning Board. We gave public notice and it was attended. There are several members of the PCE&D and they gave their unanimous consensus.

Councilman Newman questioned Mr. Gatto if the entrance on East Main Street was ever considered a one-way.

Mr. Gatto responded the engineer did not recommend it because the parking would have to be re-aligned and that intersection is controlled by NJDOT.

Councilman Kane stated this parking study has been going on for over two years. The engineers have been trying to improve the flow and this is what they feel is the best plan.

MaryAnn Earle stated she has been on the committee that has been working on this and it is time to move forward with this.

Mr. Steinberg stated he is a taxpayer in the Borough and he is invested in many different locations here. He stated the letter that was given to the Market Yard tenants did not include the entire Special Improvement District.

Peggy DiBenedetto stated there is a business owner who has his car parked around the clock in the 15 minutes unloading zone. This parking spot needs to be patrolled.

Mr. Bellina stated this area will be patrolled by the police department.

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilwoman Shutzer:

RESOLUTION TO CLOSE PUBLIC PORTION.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilwoman Shutzer:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold that an Ordinance entitled, "ORDINANCE #2011/6 ADOPTING OFFICIAL MAP ESTABLISHING DESIGNATED PARKING AND CIRCULATION PLAN OF THE MARKET YARD PARKING LOT" be, and same is hereby adopted on second reading.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated this study has been done but there will be modifications to it. He has also expressed some of the issues that were brought up by Mr. Steinberg and he agrees with the entrance being a one-way. He also feels the traffic flows are a concern and the Borough is not charging enough for parking.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 8 on the Agenda as follows:

“Second Reading and Public Hearing: Bond Ordinance #2011/7 Providing for the Acquisition of a New Ladder Truck, Equipment and Improvements for the Fire Department in and by the Borough of Freehold, in the County of Monmouth New Jersey Appropriating \$1,250,000 Therefor and Authorizing the Issuance \$1,190,000 Bonds or Notes of the Borough to Finance Part of the Cost Thereof.

Council President Schnurr opened the meeting to the public.

There was no public comment.

Councilwoman Shutzer the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Sims:

RESOLUTION TO CLOSE PUBLIC PORTION.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Councilwoman Shutzer offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Sims:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold that a Bond Ordinance entitled, “**BOND ORDINANCE #2011/7 PROVIDING FOR THE ACQUISITION OF A NEW LADDER TRUCK, EQUIPMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FOR THE FIRE DEPARTMENT IN AND BY THE BOROUGH OF FREEHOLD, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$1,250,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,190,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF,**” be, and same is hereby adopted on second reading.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 9 on the Agenda as follows:

“Introduction of and Authorization to Publish Ordinance #2011/8 of the Borough of Freehold, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey Regulating Private Storm Drain Inlet Retrofitting.”

Councilwoman Shutzer offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman DiBenedetto:

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold that an Ordinance entitled “**ORDINANCE #2011/8 OF THE BOROUGH OF FREEHOLD, COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, STATE OF NEW JERSEY REGULATING PRIVATE STORM DRAIN INLET RETROFITTING**” be, and same is hereby approved on first reading; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk be and she is hereby authorized to publish said Ordinance in the Asbury Park Press and that same shall be further considered for final passage after public hearing at a meeting held on July 18, 2011 and that during the week of said meeting copies of the Ordinance shall be made available at the Clerk’s office to members of the general public who shall request same.

Mr. Bellina stated this ordinance allows the Borough to install the correct storm drain inlets. He stated that when private neighborhoods, such as Patriot Pointe, repave their roads or make other improvements to their development, they must comply with new catch basins that the public roads have been using for quite some time.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 10 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution Confirming the Special Assessment Roll of the Special Improvement District.”

Council President Schnurr suggested tabling Agenda Item Nos. 10 and 11.

Ms. Higgins stated that Agenda Item No. 11 cannot be tabled.

Rich Gatto approached the governing body and questioned what the statutory issues would be if this item is not passed. He stated the FCP budget was presented to the governing body by the second week of March. The request that has been made for the last several years is unchanged and stays the same at \$245,000. Mr. Gatto received a letter from the tax assessor stating he has examined the tax rolls and he has reviewed and certified them. He stated there would be no objection to the FCP because the total amount to be raised would not change in any scenario.

Council President Schnurr stated what the SID pays might change. He stated he would like to fix everything first and then vote on it. He also received messages from two property owners and he has an email from another property owner.

Mr. Gatto responded the tax assessor has given his opinion twice on this matter.

Ms. Higgins stated the remedy to this would be to file an appeal. She was in contact with Mitch Elias, the Borough Tax Assessor, and he certified the boundaries of the SID again.

Councilman Kane stated the SID budget has been ready to go since March. If anyone has a discrepancy they should go through the appeal process.

Ms. Higgins stated the remedy would be to go through the appeal process. The tax assessor has already sent the rate to the County.

Richard Daesener, stated ever year since 2006 when the ordinance was passed we had to fill out a form, send it back to the Borough listing which properties were commercial and which were residential.

Mr. Steinberg stated the appeal process is April 1st. If you don't make it by April 1st then you have to wait until the next year.

Jeff Friedman, 3 Broad Street, stated he has done considerable research on this and it is his understanding that if it is an income producing property it is taxable under the SID. He stated as a property owner, when it comes to the boundary map there are properties such as Family Realty, the back portion of the Silvert's parking lot, the warehouse, Dolly's Screen Printing, all of these properties are definitely within the boundary of the SID, as it was originally created. They have been either converted to commercial use from residential use. There is no reason that Family Realty is not in the SID. This should be inclusive. He stated he thinks the SID is a great thing it keeps the downtown very vital.

Council President Schnurr stated he would go forward but he would vote no on both of these resolutions because there are enough questions here for us to take a second look.

Mr. Gatto stated there are statutory consequences of not approving the SID budget and they are in no fault of the Special Improvement District.

Council President Schnurr stated if there needs to be a special meeting then that's what we will do.

Mr. Gatto stated it is already June 27, 2011. There is no time to hold a special meeting.

Rob Kash, former chairman of the FCP, the FCP has a budget similar to the Boroughs. It would be no different than if someone appealed their property taxes.

Ms. Higgins stated she just heard from the tax assessor and he said residential portions are not taxed on the SID rate and they are not included in the SID Assessment Roll.

Councilman Newman asked what would happen if we passed the SID budget and not the Assessment Roll.

Ms. Higgins replied you cannot pass one resolution without passing the other one.

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilwoman Shutzer:

RESOLUTION CONFIRMING THE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT ROLL OF THE SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; Council President Schnurr opposed; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 11 on the Agenda as follows:

“Public Hearing and Resolution Adopting the 2011/2012 Budget of the Special Improvement District.”

Council President Schnurr opened the meeting to the public.

Carl Steinberg, 2 Monmouth Avenue, stated there are certain properties within the SID boundaries that are not being taxed. He showed the governing body a map highlighting the SID district which was modified in 1994. Since then the SID district has not changed, what has changed since 1994 are three different ordinances eliminating the possibility of residential properties within the SID. There are two properties that were residential but are now businesses. One is a law office and the other is a psychiatrist. These businesses are in the district but they are not being taxed. We have asked that this be changed at the FCP but we were told the FCP doesn't make the district it is a Borough council decision. When we've asked the council we've been told it has to come from the FCP. This has become a “ping-pong” game. Mr. Steinberg highlighted businesses on the map that do not pay the SID tax. He feels everyone who is in the SID district should have to pay the SID tax.

Mr. Bellina offered to sit down with the tax assessor, the Borough attorney and Mr. Steinberg so that they can answer any of Mr. Steinberg's questions and resolve anything that he thinks that might be in error.

Councilman Newman asked if the tax assessor could attend a council meeting so that everyone can follow along because he spoke with Mr. Steinberg today and if he is right than those businesses should be taxed at the SID rate.

Ms. Higgins stated this is a public hearing on the budget so this is not the appropriate time to discuss this but she will speak with Mr. Elias and see if he can come to a council meeting.

Council President Schnurr stated he appreciated all the work that Mr. Steinberg has done on this.

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman DiBenedetto:

RESOLUTION TO CLOSE PUBLIC PORTION.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Sims:

RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE 2011/2012 BUDGET OF THE SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT.

Council President Schnurr stated he is voting yes because of the reasons the FCP discussed. His problem is more with the actual Assessment Roll of the SID, not with the budget itself which remains flat.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 12 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution Accepting the 2010 Fiscal Year Audit Report as Prepared by John J. Maley, Jr.”

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Sims:

RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE 2010 FISCAL YEAR AUDIT REPORT AS PREPARED BY JOHN J. MALEY, JR.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated there was one small area of non-compliance.

Mr. Bellina stated a year ago we opted out of the State Health Benefits Plan and when you go with a private insurance carrier you are required to prepare a report to show what your liabilities are. Because we opted to go back into the State Health Benefits Plan, nine months later, it just wasn't cost effective to prepare this study.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 13 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold Approving Renewal of Alcoholic Beverage Licenses July 1, 2011 – June 30, 2012.”

Councilman Sims offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Newman:

RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF FREEHOLD APPROVING RENEWAL OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE LICENSES JULY 1, 2011 – JUNE 30, 2012.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated he was abstaining because of his involvement with the Freehold Spirit Shoppe.

On roll call Council Members Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; Councilman DiBenedetto abstained; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 14 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution Authorizing Fireworks Display – Freehold Center Partnership.”

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilwoman Shutzer:

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING FIREWORKS DISPLAY – FREEHOLD CENTER PARTNERSHIP.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated there was a concern about a back-up water supply for both of these fireworks resolutions in case of a fire.

Mr. Bellina explained after speaking with Mr. Jackson, the fire official, he thinks we will be okay and he is getting the Freehold Raceway to certify that the reservoir would be sufficient should there be a fire.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated the fireworks would be held on July 3rd and the rain-date is July 4th.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 15 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution Authorizing Fireworks Display – Italian American Association of Monmouth County.”

Councilwoman Shutzer offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman DiBenedetto:

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING FIREWORKS DISPLAY – ITALIAN AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF MONMOUTH COUNTY.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated these fireworks would be held on Saturday, July 16th.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 16 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution Awarding a Contract for Throckmorton Street Pedestrian Crosswalk and Sidewalk Improvements.”

Councilman DiBenedetto offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Kane:

RESOLUTION AWARDING A CONTRACT FOR THROCKMORTON STREET PEDESTRIAN CROSSWALK AND SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENTS.

Mr. Bellina explained the Borough will be paying \$156,000 for this improvement, which is 38% of the total cost. The rest will be paid for by two grants that were awarded to the Borough to do the sidewalks from Main Street all the way down to Monmouth Avenue.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Newman, Schnurr, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; oppose none; abstain none; absent none. Council President Schnurr declared the motion adopted.

Council President Schnurr read Item No. 17 on the Agenda as follows:

“Resolution Approving Change Order Number 1 for the Improvements to Sheriff Street, Haley Street and Prospect Place.”

Councilwoman Shutzer offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman DiBenedetto:
