

The Regular Meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold was held on Monday, April 7, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building.

Mayor Higgins stated that the notice of the time, date and location of the meeting had been provided pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 231 of the Laws of 1975 (Open Public Meetings Act).

Councilman Kane opened the meeting with the Salute to the Flag, followed by a moment of silence.

Councilwoman Shutzer offered a motion to accept the Supplemental Minutes from March 3, 2014 and March 17, 2014 and Council Meeting March 17, 2014 and was seconded by Councilman Sims.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Kane, Griffiths, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; Councilman Schnurr absent. Mayor Higgins declared the motion adopted.

Mayor Higgins read Item No. 5 on the Agenda as follows:

Councilman Griffiths offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilwoman Shutzer:

Councilwoman Shutzer stated this Resolution was presented to Reverend McGuire by Councilman Schnurr.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Griffiths, Kane, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; Councilman Schnurr absent. Mayor Higgins declared the motion adopted.

Mayor Higgins read Item No. 6 on the Agenda as follows:

“Proclamation of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Freehold Designating April 25, 2014 as “Arbor Day” in the Borough of Freehold, New Jersey.”

Councilman Griffiths stated the Shade Tree Commission is working on several projects including a poster contest for Arbor Day and the commission will be receiving a lot of tree seedlings which will be offered to the residents once they mature.

Mayor Higgins introduced Gerry Riccardi, Area Manager, JCP&L.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated Mr. Riccardi is the person responsible for getting JCP&L to get the line put in down on Center Street to help address the power issues of Hudson Manor and the Rug Mill.

Mr. Riccardi stated the Rug Mill is a unique, old building and it does not have any back-up generators and when there is a major power outage we would have to wait to get the entire infrastructure repaired before the Rug Mill got power back. After working with the governing body, they let us know how important that entire area was. So what we did was we took another circuit out of the substation that covers Throckmorton Street and Rhea Street and upgraded the wires so it could handle the load and ran that new circuit down Spring Street. This enables us to get the power back on in the Rug Mill much quicker.

Mayor Higgins thanked Mr. Riccardi for all of his help in getting this line put in.

Mayor Higgins read Item No. 7 on the Agenda as follows:

Mayor Higgins opened the meeting to the public.

There were no comments.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated this is about our eighth Interlocal shared service agreement with a neighboring town and this will not take away from this individuals hours or duties that he is required to do for the Borough.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated this is one more example of our doing what we've been encouraged to do by the State, which is to share services.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Griffiths, Kane, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; Councilman Schnurr absent. Mayor Higgins declared the motion adopted.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated she was sorry to see Jeff Surgent resign from the Recreation Commission due to his job. He served long and hard and very effectively on that committee for quite a while.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated as the liaison to the Recreation Commission, he thanked Jeff Surgent for his contribution to the town. The Borough wide yard sale which has been a great success was his idea.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Griffiths, Kane, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; Councilman Schnurr absent. Mayor Higgins declared the motion adopted.

Mayor Higgins read Item No. 15 on the Agenda as follows:

Councilman Kane offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Griffiths:

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Griffiths, Kane, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; Councilman Schnurr absent. Mayor Higgins declared the motion adopted.

Mayor Higgins read Item No. 16 on the Agenda as follows:

There were none.

Mayor Higgins read Item No. 17 on the Agenda as follows:

“2014 Capital Budget Review.”

Mr. Bellina stated we funded the design for the Jackson Terrace and McElwaine Drive project last year. In 2013 we got word from the County that they’ve been making some

improvements to the intersection of Jackson Terrace and East Main Street but since nothing has been done we are going to forge ahead this.

On Marcy Street you will see there is nothing there. We funded a brief design and submitted a grant application to NJDOT and they still have no idea when or if they will be granting any State aid to local governments this year. There are deplorable road conditions throughout the State and the money may be going towards that.

On Avenue A and Avenue C we funded the design last year and we gave the engineers the go ahead three weeks ago and hopefully this will be out to bid during the summer months and the work being done in the fall.

The NJDOT grant application for Murray Street is for design only. This road is the worst road that intersects with a State road in the town. This is the one that we should target if we get a positive word on Marcy Street. If we don't get anything on Marcy Street we should resubmit for what we did last year.

The Park Avenue School Parking Lot is not being paid for by the Borough. Mr. Bellina met with the superintendent and business administrator a couple weeks ago and if you're facing Park Avenue School, all the way in the back, the dumpsters and that driveway out to Park Avenue is the area in question. We talked about this in one of our projects that we bid on this year and we put that work in it. They will pay for the engineering directly to the engineers and we will incorporate the design in our bid specs and then they will pay us for the work that is done.

Mr. Bellina stated there may be some funds for Safe Routes to Transit. In our bicycle and pedestrian plan that was prepared about two or three years ago they talked about putting a sidewalk along Park Avenue. It was talked about at the Land Use Committee meeting earlier this year. This is a potential project.

Mr. Bellina stated we have talked numerous times about emergency generators. We had the engineer do a study to determine what is needed. Those that are needed in order of importance are for the firehouse and the water plant. These are both 50 years or older and are in dire need of replacement. We received a grant for approximately \$100,000.00 for the firehouse generator. We are also replacing a 2001 dump truck. The Brine Pre-Treat System, which is the wetting solution that goes down before a storm will be installed on two dump trucks. The large expense is the tank and the dispensing unit. Monmouth County has just installed a system and they will allow us to buy the solution from them at 12 cents a gallon. This helps treat the first 1-2 inches of snow and that prevents us from having to put rock salt down at \$50.00 a ton. It is too soon to talk about the E-Ticketing System. The Light Tower will be a large unit and an ideal spot for it would be at the corner of Center Street and Jackson Terrace. This tower will be very useful when we have prolonged power outages.

Mr. Bellina stated regarding the Manalapan Avenue and Broad Street sewer improvements that will only come to pass if there is a reason to implement the agreement that you received.

Councilman Sims asked regarding the light tower, the County OEM has an emergency working group that meet with all the towns. Is there any way of having our OEM go back to them to see if there is grant funding available for the tower.

Mr. Bellina asked Councilman Sims to give him the contact information.

Mayor Higgins opened the meeting to the public.

Mr. Paul Vandever, 30 Jackson Street, stated he is a resident of the Rug Mill Towers. He has some concerns with the new management that has taken over. He feels they are overbearing

regarding the collection of rent and they also want to breakdown and take away the community room.

Ms. Bertha Bowls, 30 Jackson Street, stated she would like to know the names of the owners of the Rug Mill.

Mr. Bellina stated Ms. Bowls should leave her name and address with the clerk and she will provide the information to her.

Mayor Higgins stated Councilwoman Shutzer has been working for the governing body to try and address some of your concerns at the Rug Mill. He is not sure what they can do because it is a privately managed building.

Councilwoman Shutzer asked if the tenant group met with the new management yet.

Ms. Bowls stated that presently they are under reorganization of the officers and they haven't met yet.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated she is not an investor in the Rug Mill and she encouraged the residents not to believe everything you hear. She has worked very hard on the issues of safety and their well being regarding no lighting during the electrical outages and any infestations that they may have had. She sought the help of Assemblywoman Casagrande and asked her to sponsor some kind of legislation that would require emergency lighting in the buildings. As far as the community room, unless it is stated in your lease that there will be a community room, equipped with a television and sofa, there really is nothing that we can do. When she spoke with the attorney, she said that this is a privately owned building and we cannot force them to do anything. The business administrator and I have a meeting scheduled with the management company at the Rug Mill. Councilwoman Shutzer made a list of what was said and she doesn't want to give any false hope because we do not hold any power over a private business.

Mayor Higgins stated if there are public safety issues or code issues, these things can be handled by the police department or the code enforcement office.

Mr. Rich Camero, 30 Jackson Street, asked what falls under "Quality of Life" issues. These are elderly residents who are in wheelchairs or using walkers and the community room was their only recreation area. On New Year's Eve and Christmas Eve, whoever was in the building would come down to the community room usually with a cake or cheese and crackers, etc. and watch Midnight Mass from Rome. On New Year's Eve, whoever was alone with no place to go would come downstairs and watch the ball drop. All of the furniture was donated and the community room brings everyone together. To him this is quality of life issue. The management company won't listen to us. All the residents are asking is for the governing body to advocate for them.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated that you have never had a more vocal advocate then you have in her and she will absolutely advocate for them. She has heard everything that was said and she's taken notes and she will bring all of this up.

Mr. Camero stated the television has already been removed. They want to make a community room near the lobby with a lock and key only open from 9:00 AM – 5:00 PM.

Ms. Bowls stated the Borough helped to acquire money from the New Jersey Mortgage Housing and Financing Agency for the Rug Mill Towers, which has tax deferred status.

Ms. Higgins, Esq., stated that Councilwoman Shutzer has indicated that she will be meeting with the management company and advocating your requests. We cannot dictate to them what they can and cannot do in regards to the community room. She doesn't know what your leases say, she doesn't know if the lease gives them the opportunity to use the community room. The Rug Mill is a federal tax credit entity which means when it was formed the investors got tax credits from the federal government and that's how they funded the project. It is a little different then the NJHMFA, they did have a pilot program for the taxes but that's because they are an affordable housing entity. This is really a tenant issue and you are going to need to organize your residents and address as a group.

Ms. Bowls stated a few years ago it was said the Rug Mill was given a grant for improvements. How can we find out what was in the grant and if the improvements were done.

Ms. Higgins, Esq., stated she doesn't know who would have given them a grant.

Mr. Paul Vandever, 30 Jackson Street, stated they also shut down the garbage shoots.

Ms. Higgins, Esq., replied these are valid concerns and Councilwoman Shutzer will address them when she meets with the management company.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated the residents need to get their tenant groups organized and meet with the new management company.

Councilman Sims offered the following Resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Kane:

RESOLUTION TO CLOSE PUBLIC PORTION.

On roll call Council Members DiBenedetto, Griffiths, Kane, Shutzer and Sims voted its adoption; opposed none; abstain none; Councilman Schnurr absent. Mayor Higgins declared the motion adopted.

Mayor Higgins called upon the members of the council for their comments.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated the President and long time member of the Freehold First Aid Squad is with us this evening. They will accept contributions at anytime. To the folks at the Rug Mill and all the other residents in attendance this evening, the first aid squad does not do fundraising over the phone. If you get a letter from the first aid squad on their letterhead, then that is legitimate, but do not do any fundraising over phone. They also do not knock on doors and they only communicate through the mail.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated she will be meeting with some of the senior facilities in town along with the first aid squad. The very popular program that the County co-sponsored with us called "The Storm" which was to keep seniors ready for disasters ran out of grant money and they had to reapply. This is the program that handed out disaster kits. She has asked for the program to come back to town but they are trying to get to the shore areas of Monmouth County first and since Freehold Borough already had it we were placed pretty far down on the list.

Councilwoman Shutzer stated that April is Alcohol Awareness Month and the purpose of this is to increase public awareness and understanding, reduce any stigma and encourage local communities to focus on alcoholism and alcohol related issues. It is an increasingly great public health issue with underage drinking. The Municipal Alliance main fundraising event is their annual golf outing at Cream Ridge Golf Club on July 1, 2014.

Councilman Sims had no comment this evening.

Councilman Kane thanked everyone for coming to the meeting and voicing their concerns. He expressed to the residents of Rug Mill Towers that during the storms we didn't particularly like the answers we were getting from the Rug Mill which is why we are in contact with Gerry Riccardi from JCP&L. When Councilwoman Shutzer tells you that she will advocate for you, she will. We are elected by the residents in town and he expressed to them that they did not waste their time coming to the meeting.

Councilman Griffiths stated as liaison to Code Enforcement, what the mayor said to you at one point was if the issues are code or public safety issues, we are the place to come. When it isn't a quality of life issue we cannot enforce anything but we can make suggestions, which we will. But if you have quality of life issues like infestations or problems with garbage those are issues that code enforcement can look into so don't hesitate to call the Quality of Life Hotline and the phone number is 732-462-5812.

Councilman Griffiths stated Arbor Day is coming up and he thanked the Shade Tree Commission for their work in getting the three elementary schools in the Borough involved in the poster contest for 5th graders. Next Monday, April 14, 2014 at 5:30 PM will be the first meeting of the Freehold Borough Innovation Committee and the scope of their interest is the improvement of the Borough website.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated that he has been able to get to know a few of the residents from the Rug Mill at his business on South Street and we will do anything within our power to try and help everyone out.

Councilman DiBenedetto stated the Easter Egg Hunt will be on Saturday, April 12, 2014 at 10:00 AM at Park Avenue School. He also thanked Jeff Surgent for his dedication for volunteering on the Recreation Commission. We are looking forward to the Downtown Events. The flowers will be planted on Saturday, May 17th and asked if anyone would like to come out and help plant flowers to get in contact with the FCP.

Mayor Higgins thanked the residents from the Rug Mill for coming to the meeting and your comments are in the record and we are aware of the issues and you have our attention and we will be responsive to your concerns and Councilwoman Shutzer will be a strong advocate for you.

Mayor Higgins stated that downtown Freehold is ready for the nice weather. The tables are out and hopefully within the next week or so everyone will be bustling on the street and we encourage you to come out and visit our restaurants and stores. Memorial Day is coming up and the 3rd Annual Spring Clean-up will be held Saturday, May 17th. We have dumpsters at Park Avenue School, at the Learning Center and at the public works yard. We will also have a shredder that will be at the Borough Hall parking lot on May 17th from 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM.

Mayor Higgins stated the fitness campaign will be getting started again in April. We have bicycle rides, events at the pond and walks downtown planned. Olde Freehold Day will be in June this year.

Mayor Higgins stated if you have concerns regarding public safety to please contact Police Chief Roberts. Our next meeting will be held on April 21, 2014 at 7:00 PM.

Mayor Higgins stated we received a letter to Mr. Bellina from Vincent Halleran, an attorney across the street referencing Angel Colon, an employee of the Public Works Department. The letter stated the following:

“I wish to bring the above individual to your attention. Several months ago I had the occasion to meet Angel while he was working on West Main Street. At the same time, my attention was drawn to what appeared to be a diligent hard working employee. I had the occasion to engage him in a brief conversation and his comments indicated to me that he was proud of the Borough and interested in doing a good job. In summary, I congratulate the Borough for having such a dedicated employee, he is truly a credit to the community. Thank you.”

Mayor Higgins recognized not only Angel but everyone in the public works department, as well as, the police department, fire department and first aid department.

Mayor Higgins called for a motion to adjourn.

Councilwoman Shutzer offered the motion to adjourn, seconded by Councilman Griffiths.

MOTION TO ADJOURN.
